“Hartford Renaissance” Event Celebrates Artist Romare Bearden’s City Ties

Hartford, Connecticut (February 17, 2015) - On Saturday, February 28, in celebration of Black History Month, the Hartford Commission on Cultural Affairs, in collaboration with the Hartford Public Library, will host “Hartford Renaissance - Celebrating the Art of Romare Bearden,” the first in a series of community conversations on art and culture. This free event is designed to honor the artist Romare Bearden and to provide a forum for public dialogue about his importance as an influential fine artist and his relationship to Hartford. The program will be held from 9:00 AM – 12:00 noon at Hartford Public Library’s Downtown location, 500 Main Street, Hartford.

“The recent installation of two murals by the renowned artist Romare Bearden at Hartford Public Library acknowledges and reaffirms the 35-year-old public-minded vision of a few,” said Carlos

Hernández Chávez, Chair of the Hartford Commission on Cultural Affairs. “Having these magnificent works of art available for free public viewing is evidence that when citizens and government work together in earnest for the common good, the quality of life is greatly enriched for all.”

“Hartford Renaissance” will feature a performance by The Iron Poets, as well as a panel discussion with the following guests:

Guests will break into small group discussions following the panel. A continental breakfast and full lunch will also be served.

The event is part of the Library’s ongoing Black History Month programming. Romare Bearden, whose richly textured paintings and murals are now held in the most important museums in the United States, was commissioned to create two large murals for the Hartford Civic Center in the early 1980’s. They have lived there ever since, until the Civic Center (now the XL Center) was scheduled for major renovation in 2014. Hartford Public Library has the extraordinary honor of housing and displaying these Bearden works for all to enjoy; a public setting and safe home that will be accessible to Hartford residents in perpetuity.
